Support for Palace Parade shops and businesses

In the winter, WERA was approached by some of the shopkeepers in the Palace Parade, at the corner of Park Road and Priory Road, asking for support over their proposed rent rises. WERA wrote to the Warner family, which still owns the freeholds, saying:

"The shops are extremely important to the local community – not just the Warner roads but Cranley Gardens, the Rookfield estate and the surrounding area... Unlike many other small shopping parades which have empty units, ours has almost always had a full and varied complement of shops and businesses.

We consider them an integral part of our community and would hate to lose any of them. If there is anything you can do to ensure that these businesses will be able to continue, we request that you do so."

We received a friendly response and understand that negotiations are continuing.

Palace Parade (see photo) was designed by John Farrer in 1905. It is locally listed and well maintained by the Warner family. It creates an attractive frontage for the thousands of people coming down Alexandra Palace Way.

21st Century Homes

Knowing the interest WERA residents have shown in making their homes more energy efficient, we asked the Muswell Hill Sustainability Group to organise a 21st Century Homes event locally. The Highgate Society held the first of these in 2012, then in 2013 there was one in Muswell Hill.

So in March the Hornsey and Crouch End 21st Century Homes event was held at the Moravian church in Priory Road. On the Saturday afternoon, there were speakers and displays by architects and technical experts. Topics explored included renewable energy, insulation, heating systems, solar power and government grants. On the Sunday, there were visits to local homes. Over the weekend more than 150 people attended, including many WERA residents.

Wild flower garden

Last year we asked the Parks Department to put topsoil in the large planter in the middle of the Muswell Hill/Priory Road junction so that we could plant flowers. We planted daffodil bulbs, which came up in the spring. But it wasn't necessary to do summer planting because the planter has filled up with wild flowers. Some groups in Haringey have spent years trying to create wild flower gardens without success; we did it without trying, helped by the poor-quality topsoil (which wild flowers prefer) and the judicious sprinkling of poppy seeds by a local resident.



Alexandra Palace and Park

There is more encouraging news for the future of Alexandra Palace with Duncan Wilson as Chief Executive. A successful Stage 1 bid was made to the Heritage Lottery Fund to restore the Victorian theatre as a new cultural and performance space and the former BBC TV studios as a visitor attraction.

The Alexandra Palace Trust is seeking private sector partners to invest in a hotel and the events business.

There have been lots of events at the palace and the park. Sometimes residents have had concerns about noise but the palace and park management have responded quickly to problems. An active Friends of Alexandra Park group (www.friendsofalexandrapark.org) organises work sessions and other activities to improve the park.

Farewell to Neil

Over 50 people came to a farewell party in September at the Three Compasses pub for Neil Gunnery, who had been postman for the WERA area for eight years. Much to his sorrow, he was moved to another round. WERA organised a collection and we presented Neil with a cheque. We do still see him occasionally because his new round includes Barrington Road, and we are very fortunate that we still have Neil's colleague, Charles Kwarteng, as one of our regular local postmen.

Local health services

Last July about 40 members attended the WERA Annual General Meeting to hear Dr Peter Christian, a local GP and member of the Haringey Clinical Commissioning Group (CCG), talk about NHS organisational changes. CCGs, made up of GP practices, have taken over from Primary Care Trusts and are now responsible for planning, paying for and monitoring health services.

Dr Christian explained that GPs have a good understanding of what patients need and will use this knowledge in commissioning services.

Hornsey Depot site

After 15 years of plans and protests, another planning application for the Hornsey Depot site in Hornsey High Street got planning permission (by the planning committee chair's casting vote) in March. The development will include 438 housing units and a large Sainsbury's store (for full details see the council website reference HGY/2013/2019).

There were four well-attended public meetings to discuss the planning application. Most local people are in favour of the site being developed but have serious concerns about the housing density, the height of the residential blocks, the size of the supermarket, the extra traffic and the loss of the former public baths frontage and the view of Alexandra Palace. The Reuse and Recycling Centre will move to Western Road.

Priory Common Orchard

Priory Common Orchard at the bottom of Redston Road is thriving, with weekly work sessions. Because it is by the bus stop on the main road, it gets lots of visitors inspecting the plants and reading the explanatory notices. Thanks to Gemma Harris and other volunteers for their work.

HornseyN8

Some WERA members are involved with HornseyN8, a network of groups around the Hornsey High Street and Priory Road area. HornseyN8 organised a photographic exhibition called 'Hornsey High Street 2013' at the Three Compasses pub in November. After Christmas, there was a well-attended walk around the Hornsey High Street and the Hornsey Water Works and Filter Beds conservation areas. The group was invited to see the inside of the Turkish cultural centre and mosque (formerly the Magic Flute Banqueting Suite) – they were impressed by the restoration work.

Local activities 2013/14

Traffic

A number of traffic issues were taken up by WERA and by Jim Jenks, our excellent ward councillor (who is also a WERA committee member):

Inappropriate 'build-outs' on Danvers Road were removed and appropriate ones installed on Warner Road.

There was a follow-up review of the impact of the South Hornsey CPZ.

The council carried out a consultation for a borough-wide 20mph speed limit (as introduced in some other London boroughs). No decision has yet been made about this.

Ongoing concerns relate to the speed of eastbound Priory Road traffic (the police have been doing speed checks) and general parking pressures.

There has been a spate of postal thefts in the area.

Lindsay Fowler of Redston Road convened a meeting of those who had had chequebooks or

bank cards stolen. She compiled a spreadsheet of these incidents which was forwarded to Lynne Featherstone MP to take up with Royal Mail.

We get useful weekly crime reports from the Muswell Hill Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT). WERA representatives attend SNT ward panel meetings and Neighbourhood Watch meetings. This enables us to put forward concerns and hear about local developments.
